A UNIVERSAL LANGUAGE?

People have dreamed of a universal language since the 17th century. Many artificial languages like Esperanto have been invented. But they haven't had much success, mainly because they are not based on any common culture or experience.

Some people have suggested that English should be the Universal Language. It is spoken regularly by several hundred million people in the whole world, and it is the official language of many countries. It is taught in most European and Asian schools. Its grammar is quite simple and its vocabulary cosmopolitan. If English is chosen as the Universal Language, what kind of English will be spoken? American English or British English? American English has become very different from British English, not just in

the way words are pronounced and printed, but in the grammar and vocabulary that are used too.

Around the world, English speakers are creating their own kinds of English. For example, an Anglo-Indian phrase is "as honest as an elephant", and an Anglo-African expression is "to eat each other's ears," meaning "to listen carefully."

One thing is certain to most people today: learning English is a "must".
